The Refugee Crisis: How can we help?

OFFER ACCOMMODATION

Offers of accommodation are unlikely to be taken up immediately, as the Government will continue to house asylum-seekers through local authorities. On the other hand, as more offers are made, this policy might change. To register a rooms in your own home, or a vacant property, try:

Although spare rooms are helpful, local governments are most in need of landlords to offer up family-sized rental properties in the UK. Landlords must be prepared to offer it as a home for any refugee family, not just Syrians, and to offer a three-year tenancy. The first 12 months of the rent will be paid for by the European Union under a scheme for placing vulnerable refugees.

With some databases such as PAIH you can specify whom you are willing to accommodate, for example a refugee of the same gender, and for how long. You are also under no obligation to say yes if the match comes through at a bad time.

You may also try asking your council to resettle 50 refugees, or write to your MP asking to fulfil the resettlement quota.

OFFER TO FOSTER

You could also help a refugee find a home by expressing an interest in fostering unaccompanied children.
